## German-Japanese Young Leaders Forum





### Program Goals

Since 2006, the German-Japanese Young Leaders Forum intends to inspire the next generation of future leaders to contribute to the relations between Germany and Japan. Young prospective leaders from various professions are invited to address politically and socially relevant issues during the forum and to deepen mutual understanding by working together. The program aims at establishing sustainable networks that will both strengthen and further vitalize the future cooperation between both countries.

### Program Outline

The annual program is held alternately in Germany or Japan and consists of a summer school and an alumni conference. Every year, the forum takes up a different specific topic which is of importance for Germany and Japan alike. The program offers a variety of opportunities for learning, networking, and exchange by organizing expert lectures, working groups, visits to institutions, and encounters with alumni.

### Target Group

Each year, 16 promising young professionals – eight German and eight Japanese – are carefully selected. Intentionally, the professional backgrounds in each group are as diverse as they can be, ranging from business, politics, administration, and the

media to the academic world. Applicants should be between 25 to 35 years old. Fluency in English is required.

### Funding

In 2020/2021, the program is funded by Daido Life Insurance Company, the Mori Manufacturing Research and Technology Foundation, the Yamaoka Memorial Foundation, YANMAR HOLDINGS CO., LTD., Yuasa M&B Co., Ltd., and supported by other institutions. This covers all basic expenditure, such as costs for travel, accommodation, meals, transport, etc.

### Coordination

The Japanese-German Center Berlin (JDZB), a non-profit foundation supported by the German Federal Foreign Office and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan as well as the City State of Berlin, was established in 1985 to promote and deepen Japanese-German and international cooperation in the fields of science and culture. It serves as the coordinating institution for organizing the German-Japanese Young Leaders Forum.

### Alumni Association

In 2011, alumni of the program established an alumni association to further foster the development of sustainable networks between Germany and Japan and to actively contribute to the Young Leaders Program.
